REALIZE THE PREVALENCE OF TRAUMA

In this engaging workshop, participants will learn about the Adverse Childhood Experiences study and explore their own exposure to ACEs. Impact of adult health outcomes will be explored. Strategies for improving health and resilience will be explained.

This workshop is suitable for high school students, educators, school board members, parent and community groups, and anyone who works with children.

Duration – 1-1.5 hours

REALIZE THE PREVALENCE OF TRAUMA AND RECOGNIZE THE IMPACT ON LEARNING AND BEHAVIOR

In this interactive workshop, participants will learn about the ACEs study as explained above and explore the neurobiological and psychological impact of trauma on children. Strategies for identifying and responding to students with trauma will be discussed.

This workshop is suitable for educators, administrators, counselors, paraprofessionals and parents.

Duration – 4 hours



RESPONDING IN A TRAUMA-INFORMED WAY

In this highly engaging and interactive workshop, topics from the first two training modules will be covered. In addition, participants will explore their current instructional practices and responses to behavior. They will identify strategies that work and explore new ideas for improving the academic and behavioral outcomes for children with trauma, and ALL of the children in the class!

This workshop is suitable for educators, administrators, counselors, and support staff.

Duration – 7 hours

CREATING TRAUMA-INFORMED CLASSROOMS AND SCHOOLS

In this highly engaging and interactive workshop, topics from all of the above training modules will be covered. In addition, participants will explore classroom wide and school wide strategies for meeting the unique needs of their students with trauma. Instructional strategies and response to behavior will be explored in depth. Participants will leave with plans for immediate implementation.

This workshop is suitable for educators, administrators, counselors, and support staff.

Duration – 2 days

TRAIN-THE-TRAINER: BUILDING CAPACITY AND LEADERSHIP

This training session is designed to follow the 2-day training. The third day is for formal or informal teams. The team members will participate in visioning and gap analysis. A strategic guide developed by Dr. Sadin will be explained. Team members will leave this workshop with a one year and multi-year plan for implementation.

Duration – 1 day (Day 3 of 3)



TRAINING FOR SCHOOL LEADERS: TRAUMA-INFORMED SCHOOLS FROM THE TOP DOWN

This workshop will explore provide an overview of the prevalence and impact of trauma. In addition, strategies and challenges unique to creating trauma-informed schools and districts will be explored. Dr. Sadin's research on the role of leaders in creating trauma-informed schools will be shared. School leaders will leave the workshop with an understanding of the recommended implementation plan for creating trauma-informed schools.

This workshop is suitable for supervisors, administrators, superintendents, and school board members.


